FACULTY

John Clapp serves as director of the U.S. Department of Education's Higher Education Center for Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Violence Prevention. His research interests are in alcohol and other drug (AOD) prevention and the evaluation of human service delivery systems and programs. With over a decade of experience as a researcher in the AOD field, he has published more than 65 journal articles and authored over 75 conference papers. His work has appeared in the *Journal of Studies on Alcohol; Addiction; Prevention Science; Drug and Alcohol Review; Drug and Alcohol Dependence*, among numerous other top research journals. Dr. Clapp is currently professor, School of Social Work; adjunct professor, Graduate School of Public Health; and director, Center for Alcohol and Drug Studies, all at San Diego State University.

Tracy Downs serves as senior associate for alcohol and other drug abuse prevention at the Higher Education Center by providing support to institutions of higher education in their efforts to address and prevent problems related to AOD abuse on campus. Dr. Downs has more than a decade's experience working on campus and community AOD issues. She directed the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation–funded A Matter of Degree coalition at the University of Delaware, where she gained extensive experience developing and implementing environmental prevention and management strategies to reduce AOD problems. Before joining the Higher Education Center, Dr. Downs worked with the Alcohol Policies Project at the Center for Science in the Public Interest, Washington, D.C.

Heather Dunn Carlton directs judicial affairs at the University of the Pacific and serves as the California-Nevada regional director for The Network Addressing Collegiate Alcohol and Other Drug Issues. She formerly worked in student affairs at California State University, Sacramento, where she was instrumental in the CSU system's 2001 launch of the annual California Higher Education Alcohol and Other Drug Education Conference series.

Manuel Gómez, vice chancellor, student affairs, University of California, Irvine, started on the campus in 1972 as a counselor and then director of the Educational Opportunity Program. In the intervening years, Dr. Gómez has served as assistant and associate vice chancellor of enrollment services. During his tenure at UC Irvine, he also consulted for the U.S. Department of Education, worked as a program officer with the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education, and advised the California Postsecondary Education Commission; he has also served as interim vice president for educational outreach for the UC Irvine Office of the President.

Ralph Hingson, a researcher whose work has inspired legislative efforts against drinking and driving, joined the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) in 2004 as director of its Division of Epidemiology and Prevention Research and leader of NIAAA's college drinking prevention initiative. Dr. Hingson was formerly at the Boston University School of Public Health (BUSPH), where he had served since 2001 as associate dean for research. From 1986 to 2000, he served as professor and chair of the BUSPH social and behavioral sciences department. Research by Hingson and colleagues in the early and mid-1990s helped stimulate passage of legislation, now enacted in all states, that makes it illegal for drivers under 21 to drive after any drinking.

Joseph LaBrie, associate professor of psychology, Loyola Marymount University (LMU), is the director of Heads UP—a comprehensive alcohol awareness and treatment program that aims to curb problem

drinking by LMU students. Heads UP was named a model program by the U.S. Department of Education—one of only five programs so designated nationwide during 2005.

James Lange directs Alcohol and Other Drug Initiatives for San Diego State University (SDSU). He is also an adjunct professor for SDSU's Psychology Department, School of Social Work, and the Graduate School of Public Health. Dr. Lange is the California state coordinator for The Network Addressing Collegiate Alcohol and Other Drug Issues. His experience includes serving as lead researcher on a number of projects and consultant to a wide range of AOD prevention efforts. Dr. Lange was one of NIAAA's five Rapid Response investigators and has published in leading scientific journals on topics ranging from community responses to underage drinking, designated driver use, youth binge drinking, drunk driving and boating enforcement, seat belt use, and roadside breath-test surveys.

Shauna Quinn is project director for the Alcohol and Drug Education Center at California State University, Chico. She was instrumental in the design and implementation of the program, which began in 1988. She has authored and coauthored several successful grants with the U.S. Department of Education, California Office of Traffic Safety, community coalitions, and local foundations. She has been a speaker on the topics of alcohol and college life at national and state conferences. She has trained hundreds of students to be peer educators and finds this to be one of the most rewarding aspects of working in the field of prevention.

Ellen Reibling, director, health education, University of California, Irvine, came to UC Irvine in 1985 as a Greek adviser and where she earned a doctorate in environmental health policy and science. In 1990, she helped establish the Health Education Center. Under her leadership, the center has grown from 2.5 FTE to the current staff of eight, with more than 20 percent of the budget funded by external grants focusing on tobacco control and sexual health. Part of Dr. Reibling's job includes serving as project director for Professor Connie Pechmann's anti-tobacco ad study and supervising student interns working on this project.

Barbara Ryan was the editor of *Prevention File: Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs*, a quarterly magazine published by the Silver Gate Group in San Diego. She is senior editor at the Higher Education Center, where her responsibilities include serving as editor of the newsletter *Catalyst*. Ms. Ryan coordinated a case histories project for the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's A Matter of Degree National Media Campaign. She has authored numerous papers, monographs, and guides on AOD prevention topics, including, as coauthor, the training manual *College Alcohol Risk Assessment Guide: Environmental Approaches to Prevention*.

Robert Saltz is a senior research scientist at the Prevention Research Center in Berkeley, California. Dr. Saltz's work has centered on ways in which drinking contexts may influence the risk of subsequent injury or death. He has conducted several studies on responsible beverage service programs that seek to have bar and restaurant personnel intervene to reduce the risk of intoxication or of driving while impaired. Other research projects have included drinking among college students, work-related drinking among public-sector employees, developing indicators of drinking problems among women, and the design and implementation of comprehensive community prevention interventions to reduce alcohol-involved trauma.

Phyllis Scattergood is an education program specialist with the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Safe and Drug-Free Schools and serves as the Department's contracting officer's representative for the Higher Education Center for Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Violence Prevention.
